What is sustainable procurement?

Across the world, the public sector procures enormous quantities of goods, works and services of all types - from IT equipment or paper for office operations, to major housing developments and infrastructure projects. The public sector represents an estimated 15-20% of GDP globally.

By directing this huge spending power wisely, governments can help create markets for innovative and sustainable products and services, and help meet global and local sustainability goals.

Sustainable procurement means taking sustainability concerns into account in your procurement actions - this means thinking carefully about what you buy, buying only what you really need, purchasing products and services with high environmental performance, and considering the social and economic impacts of each purchasing decision.
